






Tesco Extra at Bar Hill, Cambridge – amazing donation of school uniform and shoes







CEMASTEA Training for our Teachers

(Centre for Mathematics, Science and Technology Education in Africa)

As a school we encourage our teachers to participate in Teachers Professional Development (TPD) programmes organised by the Ministry of Education (MoE) and we are also keen to see that they implement what they have learned.







This was a four-day training aimed at equipping teachers with skills to be able handle the 21st century learners in a way that makes learning exciting for them and also embrace Mathematics, Science and Tech related careers as they prepare for the rapidly changing world.

Teachers were also equipped on how to use ICT in Junior Secondary School (JSS) curriculum designs as a requirement in the Competency Based Curriculum (CBC) system and on how to develop learner-centered approaches to be able to to understand

and guide them into the right career paths. This is very important for grade 8 teachers as learners are expected to choose subjects based on their career path when they join grade 9 next year.

Therefore, when these students join Senior Secondary Schools, they will have common subjects and then specialised ones. We are waiting for a full report from the Ministry of

Education on the learning areas for Senior Secondary Schools under CBC starting in January 2026.

Exams



The children regularly sit both internal exams and external government exams.

The internal ones are so that the Head and teachers can assess the children's understanding of their lessons. If a child is clearly not on top of a subject, we hold remedial classes separately to enable the

child to have one on one or very small group tuition. This is sometimes done on Saturdays so that they get the attention they need.

The government exams mean that we can compare our results with all other secondary schools. As we only take children from deprived backgrounds, we know that they will need additional support to be on a level playing field with other children of the same age. English can be the area that lets our new children down. As classes are in English, it is essential that we give these children all the help they need to be able to get the full benefit from all their lessons.

Remedial Classes

The April holiday started on 8th April 2024. But our teachers and students had a different plan. Before school closed for the holiday, many students had presented their requests to the headteacher to allow them come to school during holidays, kids prefer staying in school for obvious reasons, the conducive environment for learning and playing and the meals they get means a lot to them.





Our teachers are committed to ensure all our kids thrive, so they organised a two-week remedial programme to help students in their weak areas. Also, this was a great

opportunity for students to read as many story books as possible and present their stories, discuss vocabularies in their respective

groups and before the whole class. This helps boost their reading, writing and presentation skills. Many thanks to all our teachers for committing much of their own time to support our students.

Thank you for your continued support through child sponsorship

Thank you – our sincere thanks go out to each and every one of you who sponsors or supports the children in order that they stand a real chance of reaching their goals and full potential. Every sponsorship we receive makes a significant difference to our children and helps the local community to develop and grow. Without your support, the majority of these children would drop out of education altogether – aged just 11/12 years old.

Of the 35 children that joined the school in January, only 14 are currently without a sponsor. PLEASE do consider supporting the remaining children. Without your generous sponsorship, none of them would be attending secondary school at all. The girls would end up in subservient, menial roles or married off and the boys would struggle to support themselves and thus potentially turn to crime, simply to gain enough money to feed themselves. Their options are very limited in this poverty-stricken area.

Child sponsorship – sadly the costs are escalating – can you help please?

The cost of food has escalated massively in the past couple of years. Teachers' salaries have also increased in line with government salary scales, especially as they are now well qualified secondary school teachers. Both result in the cost of feeding and educating a child increasing considerably.

Please do not feel under any pressure to increase your sponsorship unless you are happy to do so. Even an extra £5 a month will provide many meals for a child, a cost that would not be covered otherwise. Perhaps you could consider sponsoring a child between more than one person? And don't forget, a year's child sponsorship makes a fabulous Christmas or birthday present \bigcirc . Regardless of the overall cost of supporting a child, we are only asking £20 per month or £240 per year from sponsors.

Once we have added the next two classrooms onto the school, we know we will be well set for the future. It is great that the school is triving with committed children and staff.
